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FOREWORD

With normality slowly beginning to return, we have noticed each week more and more members of the public coming in to see us, here at the Strand. Although busier than ever, and with our first live auction since the pandemic on the 6th of October, we have still managed to keep the continuity of our Fixed price lists.

As always, we're pleased to present a wide-ranging selection of ancient coins. Starting with the Greek, we have a number of attractive coins from Italy and Sicily, including an extremely fine nomos from Tarentum (#3), a superb tetradrachm from Rhegium with an exceptional pedigree (#9) and a wonderful Carthaginian Electrum stater with a horse of beautiful style (#11). We have two silver tetradrachms of Lysimachos to choose from (#12 and 13) as well as numerous coins of Alexander the Great, both lifetime and posthumous issues. Representing the Peloponnese, we have silver staters from Sikyon (#26) and Olympia (#27), the latter being a fitting tribute to the recent Olympic Games in Tokyo. Into Asia Minor, we have two early electrum trites, ever popular with collectors of all fields (#30 and 31). We also have an array of Judaean silver, including two shekels (#35 and #36), a sela (#37) and a Zuz (#38). The Roman Republican period is well represented, with various impressive reverse designs. In Imperatorial coinage, we have two silver denarii of Julius Caesar (#53 and 54) and two of his assassin, Brutus (#55 and #56) as well as a rare denarius which may depict the portrait of Vercingetorix (#49). These are followed by an impressive group of Augustan denarii featuring rare reverses, and an exceptional silver denarius of Claudius, with the De Britann arch – a historically important piece (#65). The main highlights of the later Roman Imperial coins are a number of gold aureii including Nero (#66), Vespasian (#69), Trajan (#75), Hadrian (#80), Marcus Aurelius (#85) and Faustina (#89). Through the late 2nd and 3rd Centuries, some rare emperors are offered, including Pertinax (#92), Didius Julianus (#93), Pupienus (#100) and Balbinus (#101). We are also pleased to offer a selection of Celtic gold staters, silver and bronze units.

The British section although not quite as many coins as usual we still have a pleasing varied selection. The hammered starts off with a good grouping of Anglo Saxon coins, followed by three pleasing Edward III Unite's (#186-188), followed by a rare Henry VI Noble of Calais (#189). The Elizabeth I coinage see's a better than usual Pound (#190), a high grade Angel (#191) and a delightful Half Angel (#192). One of the highlights of this list is the Pattern Shilling of Elizabeth, only 3 known examples and a fabulous provenance dating back to 1791 (#193). James I is represented by an excellent Rose Ryal with the king enthroned (#194). Other hammered coinage include a pleasing Shilling of Pontefract (#203) and a high grade 1651 Commonwealth Unite with superb eye appeal (#204). Milled coins commence with a pleasing 1658 Cromwell Halfcrown (#205), a high grade Shilling of Charles II 1674 (4/3) (#207), 1687 Crown in good extremely fine (#208), a key date George I 1726 Crown (#215) and a stunning 1937 Proof Sovereign (#222).

In World Coins, we are proud to bring you exquisite selection of gold coins such as the Ducato of Federico III of Aragon (no. 241), Pierreale d'Oro from Pietro and Constanza of Sicily (no. 244), a Venetian gold Scudo of Andrea Gritti (no. 245), St. Vincent of the Portuguese ruler Joao III (no. 254) and a beautiful Japanese Koban of the Keicho era (no. 247). Our selection of silver coins is equally impressive, with a Double Speciedaler of Frederik III of Denmark (no. 227), a Testone of Lodovico Sforza of Milan (no. 240) and silver Roubles of Anna Ivanovna, Elizabeth Petrovna and Peter III (nos. 256, 257, 258). There is also an exceptionally rare Korean 1 Yang coin, of a 'Wide Yang' variety, in fantastic condition (no. 248). Our highlights include the silver Caballito Pesos, struck at the start of the Mexican Revolution, encapsulated as high grades, the masterpieces of the French engraver Charles Pillet. The incredible rarities of this list, however, are the Ming Dynasty banknote - one of the first banknotes ever known (no. 224) and the rare Peruvian pattern (no. 253) designed by Leonard Charles Wyon of which only two other examples are known.

For the Islamic coins selection, we have prepared some rarities as well, such as the Almohad Dinar (no. 266) in fantastic condition with a provenance of more than 100 years; a rare, early Ghorid gold Dinar (no. 269) of bulls-eye-type; as well as the Seljuq of Rum Dinar of Three Brothers (no. 276) in exceptional condition.

Chinese Currency

Chinese civilisation and culture developed independently from that in the west, and some of it far pre-dates similar achievements elsewhere. The invention of printing and of paper, and the use of paper as money, all occurred in China centuries before they appeared in the west.

Before the advent of currency, a lot of pre-coinage trade was based on grain and cloth, whether in barter or as a measure of value. In Europe it was either barley or wheat, and wool or linen, but in China it was rice and silk, and the use of cowrie shells as money has been recorded in China from the second millennium BC to the early 14th century.

Chinese currency is different in almost every respect to most other currencies. The coins were cast, not struck. They were made in a single metal, brass, with a single denomination. There were no designs, only inscriptions, until the 19th century, and the coins all had a central hole. The first image of a ruler appeared early in the 20th century. In the west, when the production of some part of the currency was delegated to other institutions or carried out by individuals, it was the lowest values that were produced elsewhere, but in China it was the means of carrying out higher value transactions that was produced by private merchants and banks. Very little gold was used. In China paper money was in use sporadically between the 11th and 14th centuries, and is known from as early as the 9th century, whereas it only became common in the west in the 18th century.

In the Tang dynasty in the 7th century silk was still used as a measure of value. Silver ingots known as sycee, which were cast and stamped by private merchants and banks, were produced from the Tang dynasty up to the early 20th century for large transactions and for the payment of tax because of the inconvenience of transporting large quantities of cash.

Above all, it is the continuity of the system that stands out. In England many a collector has become attracted to the history of coins on finding a Victorian coin in change.

In China, in the mid-19th century a scholar wrote that in every 1,000 brash cash in circulation, he would find at least 10 from the Sung dynasty in the 12th century and 2 or 3 from the Tang dynasty in the 7th century.

In China the barter of useful objects such as knives and spades evolved into trade with smaller copies of

those objects as a separate medium of exchange, which were introduced in the late 7th or early 6th centuries BC by the kingdom of Zhou. At the time China was not a unified country and the various provinces issued their own variations - Bronze knives (tao), spades (pu) in various forms and bronze imitations cowries circulated from around the late 7th century to 3rd century BC, as well as bronze flat discs with a central hole. The names of the denominations, place names or clan names were often inscribed on the copies.

After a long civil war the Qin state defeated all the other states, and the ruler Qin Shi Huangdi made himself the first Emperor in 255 BC. As well as building the Great Wall, he was responsible for the terracotta army and for demonetising the utensil currency. In their place he issued a ban liang coin (half ounce or 12 chu) coin with two large characters separated by a hole. In 118 BC the Han emperor Wudi replaced it with the wuzhu (5 grain) coin, also with two characters, but which had a thick rim, which were used (with interruptions) for over 700 years.

The usurper Wang Mang 7-23 AD temporarily reintroduced knife and hoe-shaped coins, in 21 different types. After a long period of political instability, early in the Tang dynasty, in 621 AD, the Emperor Gaozu introduced the Kaiyuan tongbao type of coin, which lasted until the mid-19th century – four characters around a hole, denoting not the period in which it was struck, rather than the weight, and stating that it was money.

To western eyes this is amazingly consistent but at the same time perhaps a little dull. In the west the art of the time and place where a coin was struck is reflected on the coins, whether it is that of ancient Greece or Byzantium, or in medieval, Gothic, Renaissance, neoclassical, Romantic, or modern styles.

But this is to miss the point of Chinese coins. Firstly, the whole arrangement had a religious significance, and a coin was considered perfect. The round coin with a square hole represented heaven and earth – the earth was thought to be square and heaven dome shaped. The four characters and the hole represented the five directions – top, bottom, left, right and centre; and the two sides were yin and yang. More importantly, calligraphy is an art form that is as highly esteemed, if not more so, than painting – and the way the characters were written reflected the different styles of calligraphy. It was common for famous calligraphers to be invited to provide the characters

for the next coinage, such as Ouyang Xiu and the poet Su Shi, and this reached its peak in the Northern Song Dynasty (960-1127). The Emperor Hui Zong (1101-25), who was a renowned scholar, poet and calligrapher, provided the calligraphy for the coinage himself, in what is known as the slender gold style.

Currency notes are recorded in China from at least the 9th century, but none have survived from before the 12th century and early specimens are extremely rare. Marco Polo described their manufacture in detail, but little had survived from that period until a hoard was discovered in a foundation during the sacking of the Summer Palace in 1900. These are notes from the Ming dynasty (1364-1644) issued by Emperor Hung Wu (1368-99), with a value of 1 Kuan (1,000 cash), made of mulberry paper from the mulberry tree. Although it is

not certain, it is thought

that probably all of the existing notes of this type originate from this one source. The issue of currency notes ceased soon after; no notes were issued after the Yung-lo period (1403-25), and the use of notes was only revived in the mid-19th century.



Across the top are six characters Ta Ming T'ung Hsing Pao Cha's ('Treasure Note of the Great Ming'). An ornamental border of

stylised dragons and arabesques surrounds the rest of the design below. In the centre are

two characters 1 Kuan ('Ten Strings') over ten images of strings of cash. Side panels read T'ien Hsia T'ung Hsing ('To circulated for ever and ever under the heavens') and Ta Ming Pao Cha'o ('Great Ming Treasure Note'). The large lower panel translates as 'This note of the Great Ming is printed with the approval of the Hung Wu Emperor (year 1368-1398) through the Hu Pao (the Ming Finance Department) and used side by side copper Those who counterfeit

the Great Ming notes will be beheaded while an informant will be rewarded with 250 taels of silver and with confiscated property of the convicts into the bargain'. There is a red square official seal on the back of the note. At the time one string was equivalent to 100 cash.

The note offered in this Fixed Price
List was owned by the renowned
Danish collector Sophus Black who
was stationed in China from 1902 to 1931,
collecting Chinese art and antiques during
his stay; he donated many items to museums and
other parts of his collection were sold at auction in
Asia and Europe.

Spanish-American silver 8 reales had been received in trade from the mid-16th century, followed by other foreign silver coins. At first they were melted down as bullion, but they were accepted as currency from the 18th century, often after being 'chop-marked' by local merchants to certify their authenticity, and eventually became the main currency. In the late 19th century various provincial mints began to issue their own silver coins with a dragon design, mostly made with machinery imported from England. In 1912 silver dollars issued under the new republic appeared with an image of the president, and the currency was largely based on the dollar unit.

And what of the future? The advent of a totally cash-free economy has been predicted in numerous articles over several decades, and the process has been accelerated during the Covid pandemic when people have been reluctant to physically touch money. But despite China's particularly fast moving digital technology in cashless payment and experiments with e-yuan, China itself has begun to partially reverse the trend. Because of elderly people's inability to cope with the digital age, regulations have been introduced ordering companies to accept paper money in payment, to "protect the rights of the public to use cash", and the People's Bank of China has fined several companies who did not comply with the regulations.

On the Bath mint: mint signatures are almost invariably BAĐAN or an abbreviation of, BATHEN, BATHA, BADA on one die (Aethr II B2). BEAĐN noted for Cnut Hild E [Quatrefoil], BAĐV emerges on a Scandinavian imitative die, almost certainly a blundering. Post Conquest form presents as BAĐN. Dr Martin Allen in 'Mints and Moneyers of Medieval England' table A1, has outlined a Bath Mint was known from Edward the Martyr (975-78) right the way through to Stephen (1135-54), with the exception of Harold II's reign. Aelfred had rebuilt the Town post the expulsion of the Danes, Eadgar had been crowned here in 973 and King Swein had visited Bath in 1013, where he received the submission of the western thegns. Robert de Mowbray levelled the town as a result of the 1088 rising, historically rich from the Roman period to present day, granted the status of a world heritage site in 1987.

In our last list we had another example of this type with the lis emblem in a lesser grade. Executed on a fully rounded flan showing the outer toothed borders, with a notably strong portrait. About extremely fine, reverse excellent, scarce. On Dover: Dover a coastal town in the south-eastern county Kent, contributed to what had been dubbed the (five) Cinque Ports; Hastings, Hythe, (New) Romney, Dover and Sandwich. Fifteen miles south east of Canterbury, Dover was universally considered as an important port town for the continent (as is the case today). In 1050 Edward the Confessor had commanded Earl Godwin of Wessex to attack the town after a violent affray in September, Godwin had recalcitrantly declined to assist. The castle was surrendered to William I without much of a resistance in 1066, by this point the town had been looted, burnt and ransacked. King Stephen took the castle in 1138 without much resistance. Irrespective of the internal politics that played out in and around Dover, numismatically, it has always been heavily collected, as is the case with all the *Cinque Port towns*. Hythe being the one mint incredibly hard to procure from the group.

At most mints God/ Goda appear invariably side by side, implicating the same man. Old English [OE] translation as 'good' as opposed to the Ecclesiastical modern connotation that we would fasten to it. Dr V. Smart attests that 'GODGOD' is an accidental reduplication of the initial name. Ultimately, 'God' as deity is not necessarily connected to the name or the whole selection of derivatives beginning with 'God--'; although Dolley did suggest that the name 'Godlam' was or may have a connection with agnus dei, the name of the deity must then be acknowledged, if this theory holds water, perhaps in this single isolated example. The old English word God is derived from proto-Germanic 'gudan' and has representations in old Frisian, old Dutch and old High German. The root word has even been traced back to the Sanskrit word 'hu' which means to call upon or invoke, and the Persian word 'Khoda.'

Reverse, superb moneyer mint script, outer and inner borders visible, with underlying mint brilliance. Comprehensive very fine, reverse better.

A darkly toned coin with original mint iridescence in the recesses and fields. Exceptionally well struck, displaying comprehensive details in both the portrait and legends, free from peckmarks. Distinctive triangular lips set at angles with a bolder diadem, thicker lines in the profile giving off the appearance of an armoured bust, superb horizontal drapery bars almost closing flush to the King's chin. Reverse, much as struck, iridescent toning with shocks of blue outlining the small cross linear circle and legends. Imitations known to be lighter in their weight, even when in excellent condition. Good extremely fine, much as struck, extremely rare. Worthy of further research. £2,250

Rev, pellet in centre of voided cross with hammer pellet terminals, additional pellet in the first quarter, legend surrounding, +DVNINC ON HÆST, 1.30g (S.1182; N.828; BMC XI; HHK.126; SCBI 1 [Fitzwilliam, Cambridge] 917). Dark cabinet tone with underlying mint lustre, the obverse a pleasing fusion of dark plum burgundy and ash black. Central strike on a broad flan, noticeably clear fields free from peckmarks both sides. Faint superficial lamination crack probably from initial strike, metal stable. Softly struck in only one place at 12 o'clock, mirrored on the reverse at 3 o'clock. Reverse, additional pellet in the first quarter, excellent mint moneyer script, couple die breaks. Comprehensive very fine, in a scarcer mint town.

Henry I (1100-35), Penny, Pellets in Quatrefoil type (c.1123), Winchester mint, moneyer Lefwine, crowned and draped bust facing, holding sceptre in right hand, star in right field, legend surrounds +HENRICVS REX. Struck on a slightly ragged noticeably broad flan on good metal, official incision at 6 o'clock, darkly toned with underlying lustre. Obverse portrait showing signs of being struck with a worn die, Kings crown excellent, sceptre and star visible, flatness in the facial details, legends partially visible with some mild doubling, some dishing in outer regions of flan. Reverse, slightly off centre, far more comprehensive with much of the quatrefoil design visible, legends also legible for type. Obverse good fine, reverse very fine with an excellent provenance in place, scarce.

Some fade to legends, reverse inscription legible, chip at 3 o'clock. Bold fine with all the major components in place for a weakly struck issue, an academic example of the type, scarce.

Rev, large lombardic E within central panel at the centre of ornamental cross with lis terminals, crowned lions in angles, all within a beaded and linear tressure of eight arcs, fleurs in spandrels, pellets either side of top lis below mintmark, legend commences +IHE ΛVTEM TRΛIICIEIIS P MEDIVM ILLORVM IBAT, 7.73g (S.1490; N.1183; Schneider 51). A fully centred strike on a more or less symmetrical flan, without any clipping. Tuscan gold toning equally distributed across both sides with a subtle underlying lustre, fields clear of surface markings. A great representation of the King in ship some softness to the portrait, the waves and quartered shield precise. Reverse, elaborate and impressive, the double arcs framing the various heraldry, closely packed and intricate with the large Lombardic E struck to the centre. Good very fine.

The legends translate on the obverse as "Edward by the Grace of God, King of England and France, Lord of Ireland" the reverse "But Jesus, passing through the midst of them, went His way" a Biblical passage, (see Luke 4: 30, Old Testament). Pre-Treaty is a reference to the Treaty of Bretigny (1360). The Treaty in short had ended the first phase of the hundred years wars between France and England. Acknowledged as a setback for the French, the Treaty had been signed after Edward the Black Prince overcame and captured John II of France at the Battle of Poitiers in 1356. The Treaty and Peace was short lived, War commenced once again in 1369.



187. Rev, lombardic E within central panel with annulets at corners, encased inside an ornamental cross with lis terminals, crowned lions in angles, all within a beaded and linear tressure of eight arcs, fleurs in spandrels, legend commences +IHE ΛVTEM TRΛNCIENS P MEDIVM ILLORR IBΛT, 7.71g (S.1499; N.1222; Schneider 55). An intriguing example of the Transitional Treaty series, where the French title has been omitted and replaced by that of Acquitaine, expressed in the latter end of the obverse legends. An accomplished example of the type, executed using a slightly rusty obverse die. The fundamental details in place from the ships rigging, Kings portrait, waves in sea and ornaments, legends legible, on. About extremely fine, recorded as rare within the wider series. £5,750

Edward III (1327-77), Noble, fourth coinage 1351-77, Treaty period (1361-69), mintmark cross potent (1361-69), King standing in ship with upright sword and quartered shield, within inner beaded circle, saltire stops both sides, ropes 3/2, ornaments 11-11, legend surrounds, annulet before EDWΛRD DEI GRΛ REX ΛNGL DNS HIB Z ΛQT, the Z retrograde. Rev, lombardic E within central panel encased inside an ornamental cross with lis terminals, crowned lions in angles, all within a beaded and linear tressure of eight arcs, fleurs in spandrels, legend commences +IHE ΛVTEM TRΛNSIENS PER MEDIV ILLORVM IBAT, 7.73g (S.1499; N.1222; Schneider 86-88). Handsome light golden toning, sharply struck with clear fields and legible legends. King, ship, waves, quartered shield and ships rigging well depicted, the obverse die rusty, hence the grain like appearance. Reverse, lustrous in tone with a bold floriate cross and equally impressive emblems, legends concise. Bold good very fine, reverse superb.

Rev, h struck at centre, ornate cross with lis terminals, crowned lions in angles, all within beaded and linear tressure of eight arcs, fleurs in spandrels with an annulet in top right spandrel, initial mark lis, annulet stops, legend reads IHC ΛVT TRANSIENS PER MEDIVM ILLORV IBΛT, 6.92g (S.1803; N.1415; Schneider 299). Attractive and lustrous pantone Gold toning distributed evenly to both the obverse and reverse of coin. A fetching portrayal of the King in ship compete with an expressive profile, normally the area to show fade in this denomination. The flag at stern, quartered shield, ships rigging and waves all executed with skill and definition, one scrape, legends both sides intelligible. Reverse, dies partially blocky, few surface markings. About extremely fine or thereabouts, scarce. £5,950

The Calais mint had seemingly closed for a duration after the reign of Edward III (1327-77), re-opening under the reign of Henry V (1413-22). The reasoning behind Calais being used is as follows a) A political statement showcasing the fact that England ruled this region of France, b) perhaps more significantly, it acted as an excellent intermediary between England and Europe for swift and efficient trade. The mint gradually discontinued its Gold output and finally closed its doors in 1440. York also had a mint for a short passage of time between 1423-24.

In relation to the Annulet Issue (annulet by sword arm) they were struck between 1422-1430 and were split between few types; the standard issue London Noble, a similar type using an obverse die from Henry V and the Flemish imitative type, which mimics the standard London issue. The Calais mint Noble, our example, is distinctive as it has a Flag at stern which makes it immediately identifiable from the outset. Lastly the York mint piece which incorporates a Lis over the stern, Calais and York recorded as scarce.



190. Elizabeth I (1558-1603), Pound, Seventh issue (1601-3) 'Crown' Gold coinage, mintmark 1 both sides (29th July 1601-14th May 1602), crowned bust left, inner toothed borders both sides, hair trailing loose behind, Queen wearing ruff and richly decorated dress, pellet stops, legend surrounds ELIZABETH DG ANG FRA ET HIB' REGINA. Rev, crowned and garnished flat topped quartered coat of arms, her royal cipher E and R flanking, legend reads SCVTVM FIDEI PROTEGET EAM, 11.15g (S.2539; N.2008; BC.F24; Schneider 805: BC 2). A fully centred strike with attractive bright toning, subtle mirrored surfaces in the eastern legend inscription, fields clear with the exception of some mild annealing flaws. A well-executed and imposing bust, slight softness in parts of the dress, otherwise splendid. Reverse, marginally off centre, boasting a satiny tone, underlying red mint brilliance when held to good light. The quartered coat of arms displaying little distortion in the first quarter (fleur de lis) emblems, otherwise executed with pin point clarity. Good very fine, scarce.

The Seventh issue coinage is fastened to two initial marks, mintmark 1 (29th July 1601 – 14th May 1602) and mintmark 2 (15th May 1602 – 24th March 1603). The Elizabethan Pounds were issued using Crown Gold of 22ct (0.917 fine) at a nominal weight of 174.5 gr to the pound of 20s Od. These Pounds and their halves, were the last large denomination hammered Gold coins not only in Elizabeth's reign; they also marked the close of the House of Tudor. Subsequently, with the accession to the throne of James I in July of 1603, the Jacobean era was ushered in under the House of Stuart. Aesthetically, they are unmistakably regal, tactile with a magisterial quality embodied within the portraiture. Elaborate, imposing, original and intricate types in their arrangement, an essential if not key type to the discerning Elizabethan collector. Equally, quintessential examples of the skill and artistic vision of hammered English Gold at the time.



191. Elizabeth I (1558-1603), Angel, sixth issue (1583-1600), armoured depiction of Saint Michael slaying dragon with a cross tipped staff, inner beaded circle, initial mark gothic 'A' (1582-84), pellet stops legend surrounding ELIZABETH DG ANG FR ET HI REGINA. Rev, ship in sail, quartered shield upon hull, large cross above, E and rose flanking, pellet stops, legend reads A DNO FACTVM EST ISTVD ET EST MIRABI, 5.09g (S.2531; N.2005; Schneider 787: BC 2, C29). Handsome lustrous Tuscan Gold toning with light subtle flaxen undertones, struck on a broad flan with full coverage of the legend inscriptions both sides. Under closer inspection archangel Michael portrayed with consistent detail, notable precision within the feathered wings, cross hatching to the lower legs also pleasing, with a comprehensive facial expression. Reverse, the ship in its entirety, ropes, waves, quartered shield and ornaments all first rate. Extremely fine, scarce, with a lesser seen mintmark. Fetching.

The legends translate to the following for the obverse inscriptions "Elizabeth by the Grace of God, Queen of England, France and Ireland." The reverse more in line with the Saintly design of the coin "This is the Lord's doing, and it is marvellous in our eyes." From the Psalm 118:23, Old Testament.

Gold Angels, with their inception in Edward IV's first reign continued to be issued right the way up to Charles I's time, with Nicholas Briot's pattern Angel being the great rarity known, three in private hands. The journey of the Angel saw a monetary fluctuation from 6s 8d right up to 11s, an important coin heavily collected in the hammered Gold English series, still enjoying a broad appeal today, if not a resurgence amongst collectors. The iconic and timeless design helped separate it from other earlier pieces, distancing itself from the representation of the King in ship. The lofty nautical imagery that had been in the popular consciousness since the second period Nobles of Edward III in 1344-46, were gradually replaced with the Angel from hereon in.

Set out on a broad flan with the outer borders visible, bright yellow lustrous toning both sides complimented by full and complete legends. Saint Michael showing impressive detail, some fade to the dragon. Reverse, few soft spots, the B of Mirab blocky letter puncheon, otherwise very pleasing, both mintmarks well expressed and accurate. About extremely fine for issue, rare. £6,250

This Half Angel carrying mintmark *hand* is not represented in the Schneider collection. The Herbert Schneider collection is widely considered one of the finest and definitive assemblages of gold coins outside of the British Museum trays. Possibly only one other appearing at auction since the turn of the century, this being the *ex Clarendon* piece sold via Baldwin's of St James's, Auction 9, 21st September 2017, lot 1222.

Rev, mintmark small key, long cross fourchée over heavily garnished shield, reads POSVI DEV ADIVTOREM MEV, 32mm, 6.24g (N.2044/2045; Brown & Comber P5). Light grey toning, bold clear legend inscriptions with a precise and complete mintmark, portrait and bodice all struck up using specially prepared dies, few fine scratches in obverse fields, toning spot below the R in Regi. Reverse, quartered coat of arms emblems most impressive and much as struck, superb. Good extremely fine, of the highest rarity, believed three known. This the finest example when compared and contrasted to the Norweb piece (Spink 48, 1985, lot 371). First rate, with a an exhaustive provenance dating back to the reign of George III. Truly exceptional, an elite example.

116. "Varieties have privy-mark on either side over Woolpack. A fine series of pattern shillings occur bearing the privy-mark Key .These are quite distinct from the normal shillings, having a completely different set of dies and punches. In style they resemble the gold coin of this period. They are probably contemporary with the normal Key shillings."



194. James I (1603-25), Rose Ryal of Thirty Shillings, Third coinage (1619-25), Tower mint, mintmark spur rowel (1619-20). King enthroned facing, wearing crown and mantle, holding sceptre in left hand over shoulder, ornate back to throne, portcullis below. Legend reads IACOBVS DG MA BRI FR ET HIB REX. Rev, long cross fourchee over quartered coat-of-arms, value above 'XXX', within concentric linear circles, embellished by fleur-de-lis, lions and roses. Legend surrounds and reads A DNO FACTVM EST ISTVD ET EST MIRAB IN OC NRIS, 12.43g (S.2632; N.2108; Schneider 77). A full well centred example filled to the brim with armorial heraldry, lustrous toning both sides, with a mirrored feel to the reverse. King, throne, ornamental cross hatching all first rate, legends both sides struck with clarity and consistency. Superficial crease to the obverse, not reflected on the reverse, minimal surface wear in the fourth quarter of the coat of arms, otherwise a complete example, edge marginally ragged at 3 o'clock not uncommon for the type, given contemporary edge collars were in their rudimentary phases at the time. About extremely fine, rare. £24,950

The Rose Ryal of James I was the Stuart equivalent of the late Tudor Sovereign, appearing initially in his second coinage, introduced in 1604. According to the work of Lord Stewartby there are five obverse dies A-E and a further eleven reverse dies A – K. The obverse dies generally can be worked out to where the sceptre points, the reverse dies from the relation of the sepals of the Rose to legend lettering. Lord Stewartby's work covers Rose-Ryals struck between 1605-17. (see, Lord Stewartby, 'Rose ryals of James I, 1605-17' BNJ vol. 71 (2001), 87-90).

In his third coinage, broadly between the years of 1619-25 the Rose Ryal was also struck carrying the following mintmarks; Spur Rowel (1619-20), Thistle (1621-3) and Lis (1623-4). The mintmark Trefoil (1624) was also used for the Rose Ryal which has a plain back to throne as opposed to the ornate throne (the example we have).

An adequate example, good profile for the King, on a broad yet marginally irregular flan. Very fine, reverse weakly struck.

Near very fine, bold, with some weakness in the central strike, toned.

Legends generally legible with some areas blocky, both sides. Reverse, the quartered shield showing some weakness in Irish harp, otherwise pleasing. Very fine with light grey cabinet tone, few nicks or scratches. Mintmark key considered rare for issue. £385

Reverse, some uneven toning, clean fields both sides, superb Irish harp. Recorded as a rarer type in the series, a first-rate provenance, bold fine. £400

Pontefract Castle, now a historic ruin is located in the heart of West Yorkshire. Perhaps best known today as being the site for the English Civil War sieges. It had been a staunch Royalist stronghold, with the first siege commencing in December of 1644. The second siege took place on the 21st March 1645, parliament later garrisoned the Castle in June 1648. Cromwell orchestrated the final and decisive siege in November of 1648, Charles I was soon after executed on the 30th January 1649 outside Whitehall in London. The Castle subsequently was handed on to General John Lambert on the 24th March 1649. Parliament gave strict orders that the castle be levelled and comprehensively demolished. Interestingly the siege pieces issued via Pontefract were split between coins *pre* his execution on a lozenge or diamond shaped flan; a posthumous series were also struck, set out on octagonal flans in the name of Charles II.

Struck on a fully rounded flan in good metal, the outer beaded borders visible, framing the coin. Lustrous rich red gold toning, with mint red brilliance on the reverse. The English shield struck up fully, few tiny metal flaws in the first quarter, no surface markings. Reverse, much as struck, few metal flan striations from the initial strike, conjoined shields in full clarity, seven strings to Irish harp, with red original tone fused in with the gold. Legends both sides excellent, some ghosting on obverse. A fundamentally sound example, struck with fresh dies. Good extremely fine, much as struck, rare so well preserve. £17,950

The Gold Unite of twenty shillings had been struck from 1649 until 1660, the first nine years of the type carried the mintmark Sun, the key rare date being 1655; this same date holds its rarity across all coins struck throughout the Commonwealth, both Silver and Gold. Incidentally, all British coins within this time span having legends expressed in English as opposed to Latin. The 1658 and 1660 issues were embossed with an anchor mintmark, during the protectorship of Richard Cromwell. Anchor mintmarks, irrespective of denomination or type are far more elusive and genuine rarities, significantly higher in price, sporadically appearing in the open market.

The Unites were struck in 22ct Gold, the largest denomination Gold coin available throughout the Commonwealth period. Unique and arresting in their designs, omitting any portraits or busts, with the centre of attention given over purely to the shields, the legends a clear expression of the Puritan vernacular of the day; diametrically opposed to what had come before and what was to be after. In spite of this, there is a base level of beauty to these coins, a straightforwardness found in their antithesis minimalist style. An effectiveness in their simplicity. For the first two years after the Restoration the equivalent denominations were struck [with the exception of the Silver Crown] in Charles II's hammered coinage, as were issued during the Commonwealth. Immediately, all the heraldry, a complex crowned emblematic garnished oval reverse coat of arms, a monogram, Latin legends, and most importantly a left facing royal bust were restored and re-introduced, with a Crown mintmark no less. The horrors of the interregnum were ostensibly over, Charles II's hammered issues gave back a thread of symbolic normalcy in the popular consciousness.

Reverse, prooflike fields, impeccable coat of arms, minimal hairlines. Extremely fine, scarce. Much eye appeal. £5,995

The translated obverse legends equate to the following, "Oliver by the Grace of God, Protector of the Republic of England, Scotland and Ireland." The reverse as "Peace is sought by war." The edge inscription "Let no one remove these from me under penalty of death." The Cromwellian Halfcrowns were issued in either one of two dates, 1656 and 1658. The 1656 is recorded as extremely rare and in more cases than others surfaces in *fair to fine* condition, they also have a slight difference in their legend arrangement, reading HI as opposed to HIB. The 1658 issue more often than not is the date available to commerce, additionally a proof struck Gold Halfcrown of 1658 had been struck (W&R 46; ESC. 447a), a coin steeped in numismatic folklore. The Gold proof is universally recognised as one of the great numismatic rarities in early milled coinage, with roughly six known. The Bridgewater House piece being the standard cited reference point. (*see, Bridgewater House*, 15th June, 1972, lot 127, Sotheby & Co).

Lightly toned, well centred, flan flaws on obverse at 9 o'clock synonymous with the type. A little double struck in places, good very fine, obverse weakly struck as usual. Scarce, with an excellent provenance.

Legend reads MAG BR FRA ET HIB REX, date flanking top crown, no stop after HIB, six strings to Irish harp, edge obliquely milled, (S.3375; Bull.527 [R2]; ESC.1039A). Bright with original mint brilliance, outer toothed borders visible, some haymarking both sides, common for the type. Portrait struck with precision and sharpness, a more or less full coverage of the hair curls, few surface markings. Reverse, some light hairlines, free from any nicks or major marks, minute die breaks below the AG of Mag. Mirrored fields both sides, subtle underlying mint lustre. Good extremely fine, very rare. A seldom seen variety with the overdate. Fetching.



208. James II (1685-88), Crown, 1687, second laureate and draped bust left, toothed borders both sides, legend surrounding IACOBVS II DEI GRATIA. Rev, crowned cruciform shields, garter star at centre, date flanking top crown, reads MAG BR FRA ET HIB REX. Edge inscription in +DECVS ET TVTAMEN ANNO REGNI. TERTIO, E over R in ET variation (S.3407; Bull.744; ESC 78; var). Struck on a spacious and broad flan, slate grey toning with mirrored fields and underlying mint brilliance, haymarking both sides. Portrait excellent, thorough and consistent in its details, definition and striations across all portions of King's hair, breastplate comprehensive. Reverse, some original lustre around the periphery. A rarer variety with the E over R in ET for the edge inscription. Good extremely fine, rare.

Crowns throughout the reign of James II, appear to be a straightforward and short series. Three dates available split between two forms of bust, the dies continued to be engraved by Roettier. In the first bust the 1686 Secvndo was issued, with a no stops in the legend variety and an unbarred H in HIB. The second bust covered a 1687 Tertio edge, with the following variants; i) E over R in ET for the edge inscription (as our example demonstrates) and with smaller edge lettering. The 1688 also came in second bust form with a Qvarto edge, also with an overdate for the 8 over 7, frequently seen. It could be argued all are rare in excellent condition, regardless of the aforementioned variations.

Reverse, much as struck with prooflike fields. Good extremely fine, taking into account the clash or collar shift. Much eye appeal.

The four coin Proof set of 1937 comprises of a Gold Five and Two pounds, a Sovereign and it's half with 5501 struck for each piece respectively. There is also a Proof struck Matt finish Five pounds, of the highest rarity. The complete set had been issued to celebrate the coronation of George VI, which took place on the 12th May 1937 at Westminster Abbey. The individual pieces and the sets are becoming increasingly rare to source both domestically and in the international market. They have leapfrogged in value in the last half decade, gradually stabilising, still commanding huge prices when in excellent condition. When officially graded and encapsulated sets have been known to sell for north of £19,000 with the premium at auction, dealers also reflect this in their retail prices; whether it be for the individual pieces or the complete sets. Baldwin's had sold the Matt Proof Coronation set for £55,000 without the buyers premium in 2013. [see,. Baldwin's Auctions 79, 8/5/2013, lot 1233].

Keicho Koban had been issued since 1601, during the early period of the Edo period and was a currency that had one Ryo value per one Koban. This early Koban exhibits the chisel marks in five columns which are shallow and closely spaced together, indicative of the fine crenelation associated with the early Kobans. Koban was circulated mostly in Kanto region around Edo and it was called 'financial habit of Edo'. One of the reasons for this was that there were many Samurai residences in Edo and high-ranking warriors used mainly Koban in large-amount transactions.

The Caballito Pesos and Mexican Revolution

The Caballito Peso was struck from 1910 through 1914 and was born during the beginning of the Mexican Revolution, when social liberals took a stand against the 34-year dictatorship of Porfirio Díaz. The coin features a representation of Liberty riding on a horse and holding a torch and laurel branch high above her head. Sun rays beam behind her, symbolizing independence, hope, and resilience. The obverse of the coin bears the image of a Mexican Golden Eagle perched on a cactus and grasping a writhing snake in its mouth. The Caballito Peso, which in English translates to 'the little horse' Peso was designed by French engraver and medallist Charles Pillet.

Exceptionally rare Peruvian Pattern

Very attractive example of these rare patterns superbly struck and with hints of red hues in the fields. By 1884, and following the Chilean occupation of Lima in 1881, the Lima mint was in dire condition. Consequently, the Peruvian government commissioned new dies for the silver and copper denominations through its delegation in London. Although new and talented engravers such as Florencio Davalos (grandson of famous Anastasio Davalos) were present in the engraving department of the Lima mint, its Director had made it clear that "it was not possible to engrave the dies at the (Lima) mint, since the necessary equipment and utensils are lacking after all were destroyed during the Chilean occupation". The Peruvian proof series dated 1886 were struck from the dies commissioned in England, which were engraved by Leonard Charles Wyon, son of William Wyon.

When looking at the exquisite workmanship of these dies, many have wondered why no regular coins were struck with them upon their receipt. As indicated in the mint report of 1887, the reason is a technical one since Wyon blundered on the dimensions of the hubs and dies: for the present piece, the diameter was of 19.5mm instead of the requested 19mm. Although reworked versions of the Wyon dies were used for the 1 Centavo issues of 1901 and 1904, those were clearly less attractive since the engraving of the sun's face was removed. Thus, these 1886 patterns are the only issues showing all the Wyon's work in all its glory, which adds to their importance.

First Ghorid coinage

The Ghorid dynasty, based in the central Afghan region of Ghur, became an independent power in the 12th century AD. Their first coinage, struck in 1170s, such as this coin are popularly known as the 'bullseye' type and were modelled on the contemporary Ayyubid coinage of Egypt. Its legends were arranged in concentric circles with the brother-rulers common name, Muhammad ibn Sam, in the centre. It is not known why this coin design style was abandoned but it may have been for the sake of greater legibility.

After the Battle of Köse Dagh, the Seljuq ruler Kaykhusraw II remained on the throne, his authority virtually vanished amidst his defeat. Two of his sons, 'Izz al-Din Kayka'us II and Rukn al-Din Qilij Arslan IV claimed their inheritance, however, this did not please the Great Khan Güyük who decided to make all three sons of Kaykhusraw II joint rulers. The rule of the three brothers was marked by plotting and intrigues among mercenaries who constantly switched their allegiance from one brother to another.
