FOREWORD

Hot on the heels of Auction 105, we are delighted to present the latest edition of our ever-popular Fixed Price List. This is the second of our 150th Anniversary fixed price lists, which we will continue to bring you throughout the year, celebrating the company's monumental milestone. We hope you will enjoy perusing its many pages.

The ancient coin section contains, as always, a fresh group of Greek, Roman, Byzantine and Celtic coins. Of particular note in the Greek world are a large dinomos of Thurium (#2), an impressive billon tridrachm of Carthage (#12) and a pleasing gold stater of Philip III (#21). These are followed by a beautiful electrum trite (#33) and a colossal Egyptian gold octadrachm of Arsinoe (#40), which is not to be missed.

Into the Roman world and we begin with a plethora of Republican and Imperatorial denarii including high-grade pieces of Mark Antony & Octavian (#54), and Lepidus & Octavian (#55). The Imperial section begins with coins of Augustus, with a very rare denarius depicting both Augustus and Tiberius (#57) being of particular note. We are also offering difficult-to-obtain denarii of Caligula (#60) and Claudius (#61) – essential for a Twelve Caesars collection. The Roman coins continue with more attractive denarii and antoniniani from the later empire. The scarce Late-Roman emperor, Magnus Maximus, appears in the form of a very rare gold solidus (#117) and an even-rarer silver miliarense (#118), while his son, Flavius Victor, can be seen on a siliqua (#119).

The ancient coin section closes with Byzantine gold coins and a wide variety of Celtic coins, including some very rare silver units and beautiful gold staters.

The British commences as usual with a variety of Anglo-Saxon sceats and hammered pennies, including an MS64 Hiberno-Norse long cross penny (162), a stunning Harold I penny (169) and a pleasing William I Paxs (171). Hammered gold is well represented with an extremely rare half unite of Henry IV (178), an exceptional 'restored' angel of Henry VI (183), a very rare, high grade angel of Elizabeth I (192) and lastly the finest certified by NGC 1643 declaration type, half unite of Charles I. Three coins stand out in the hammered silver section, a well struck crown of Elizabeth I (193), an extremely rare pattern shilling of Eizabeth I (194) and an imposing pound of Charles I (198).

The milled gold section sees a selection of high grade exceptional pieces, most notably two 5 guineas and two 1 guineas. (204) 1681 Elephant below five guineas, exceptionally well struck and excessively rare, (224) a choice 1729 five guinea of George II. Both guineas of George I (219 & 220) are both the finest certified and strongly struck. In the milled silver section, a proof like Charles II crown of 1662 (206), a pleasing crown of Cromwell (203) and exquisite George IV proof halfcrown (258).

In World Coins selection you will find a wide variety of Chinese coins ranging from the last days of Qing Empire to the Republic, as well as some interesting provincial minors from Chihli and Taiwan. Gold coins of Europe lead with the Greek coin of Constantine II with a very low mintage and the French coin of Louis XVIII with a unique private countermark. In European silver, a magnificent Pezza della Rosa from Tuscany, Italy is depicted, one of the most beautiful Italian coins from this period. India is represented by two fantastic gold Mohurs of Victoria, both are a must in any collection of the British India series. From South America, there are interesting silver and gold coins of Chile, Mexico and Peru, especially an uncirculated Caballito Peso with the famous depiction of Liberty. From the USA, we have a selection of Double Eagles of both Liberty Head and Saint-Gaudens types and a seldom-seen rarity that is the \$3 Dollars of 1860 San Francisco mint of low mintage.

In Islamic Coins we are proud to present exquisite Umayyad, Abbasid and Fatimid Dinars. The highlights are the Abbasid Dinar of Al-Amin which is a scarce one-year type and an early Fatimid Dinar of Al-Mu'izz - possibly the finest known in this condition, as well as a rare Fatimid Dinar of Al-Hakim. Umayyad Dinars of Al-Walid all come in fantastic condition, rarely seen so fine and about uncirculated.

On the moneyer signature, appearing as Wulfbeald. Not known for the mint or type. On consulting the SCBI 28, page 78, shows a direct match for PVLBOD, referenced in SCBI 16 [Norweb], 236. This is for a William I PAXS Penny [Plate X] struck for the Canterbury mint. Wulfbeald presenting usually as either PVLBOD, PVLBOLD.



Harold I (1035-40), Penny, Jewel cross type (c.1036-38), Lincoln mint, moneyer Sumerlede, diademed bust facing left, legend surrounds HAROLD REC. Rev, cross composed of four ovals united at their bases by two circles enclosing a pellet, reads +SVMERLIDA ON LINC, 1.06g (S.1163; N.802; BMC I; SCBI 18 [Copenhagen], 255). Struck on a full yet slightly undulating flan, subtle hints of the underlying amber mint bloom around the periphery. Excellent portrait and legends concise both sides, few die striations, a complete example. Extremely fine.

According to T. Talvio in his often cited article 'Harold I and Harthacnut's Jewel Cross type reconsidered' the Jewel Cross type is considered one of the shorter lived Anglo-Saxon coins, approximately minted from the Sping of 1036-38. Insofar as types, varieties and styles the coins usually have a royal bust facing left (they were issued with a right facing bust [see DNW, Auction 251, lot 117, 8th March 2022 – this example being a London mint, moneyer Eadweald, Copenhagen, 669) on the obverse. The reverse is home to a cross composed of four ovals, united at their bases by two circles enclosing a pellet, known colloquially as the jewel cross motif. When new types were introduced the engravers were supplied with officially approved models to ensure the coins looked uniform enough or homogeneous, in real terms this did vary. Talvio argues there are two distinct varieties based on the form of the diadem, the coins with a simpler diadem are thought to be later. The Jewel cross are known to hail from roughly 60 mint towns, and were initially divided by their geographical positioning from the Thames, utilising initial data from the Stockholm and Copenhagen collections.

The obverse legends translate to *Edward by the Grace of God king of England and France, lord of Ireland,* the reverse translates to *But Jesus, passing in the midst of them, went his way.*

Thomas Bourchier (1404 – 30 March 1486), carried the official ecclesiastical title of English cardinal, Archbishop of Canterbury, and Lord Chancellor of England. Consecrated as Bishop of Worcester on the 15th May 1434, in the same year given the title of chancellor of Oxford University, Bishop of Ely a year prior. In April of 1454 he was made archbishop of Canterbury, preceded by John Kemp and succeeded by John Morton.

Queen Elizabeth's Silver Crowns were struck exclusively within the last few years of her reign within her seventh coinage, carrying either mintmark 1 (1601) or 2 (1602-3). The Royal mint officers at the time were a Richard Martin and a Thomas Knyvett. Mintmark 1 appeared to have been struck from the 29th of July 1601, through to the 14th May 1602. Mintmark 2 came into existence from the 14th May 1602 up until the 7th of June 1603. F.R. Cooper outlined within his article in the Spink Numismatic Circular of June 1971, that most probably one pair of dies were used for the mintmark 2 Crown (recognised as a true Tudor rarity) the mintmark 1 Crown had a selection of five obverse dies and six reverse dies. Gradually becoming more difficult to procure in stronger grades, a hugely popular coin, essential for the discerning Crown collector.

The Five Guinea analysis in the Samuel King catalogue records only three 1681 Elephant & Castle Five Guineas offered for sale in the last 45 years, subsequently making this coin excessively rare and one of the finest known.

The Elephant & Castle mark signifying that the gold had come from Africa. This mark below the monarch's portrait denotes gold had been Supplied by the Royal African Company. The 'Royal African Company' was founded in 1660 as 'The Company of Royal Adventurers Trading to Africa' by Charles II, who was restored to the throne in that year, with Prince Rupert identifying various regions rich in gold and other precious commodities.

Cromwell died in September 1658 and the nation grew restless. After a year and a half, in May 1660, welcomed by Parliament, Charles entered London to a stupendous welcome from the crowds who had twenty months earlier mourned the dead Cromwell. Charles II was a popular monarch. Britain had grown restless, and the majority now resented the austerity of the Cromwellian era. Charles was a great patron of the arts, he paid attention to Cromwell's navy, and he founded the Royal Society which did much to further scientific enquiry and knowledge, graced by such figures as Sir Isaac Newton, Edmond Halley (of Halley's comet fame) and Robert Boyle who formulated 'Boyle's law' as the basis of chemistry. Charles II's companions were a group of hard drinking young men who including the Duke of Buckingham, Sir George Etherage and the Earl of Rochester. But they had a biting wit which showed itself in the Restoration drama of such playwrights as William Congreve, and in Rochester's poetry. Charles himself loved the theatre - among those he licensed was Drury Lane - and horse racing, which he established at Newmarket as the 'sport of kings.'.

Our example appears stronger in both the countermark and host coin than the W. H. Lampard piece sold via Noble Numismatics, 5th April 2016. No others appear on Coin Archives within the past two decades, seldom featuring in dealers trays at fairs or within auction listings. A genuinely rare piece, difficult to draw comparative studies with other examples due to their elusive nature, an essential piece for the discerning countermark collector.
