FOREWORD

In this digital catalogue, you'll find a selection of ancient coins from across the Greek and Roman worlds, including splendid silver pieces from Greek Italy and Sicily (#2-14) and a very attractive stater of Alexander the Great (#18). The Greek coins are followed by four cast bronze coins issued at the time of the Second Punic War, including a large Bronze As (#42). Next are a host of Republican denarii (#43-49) and Imperial coins, including silver denarii of the Twelve Caesars and a very affordable aureus of Hadrian for its grade (#60).

The British coins although a shorter section than usual, features various exceptional and rare examples. The highlight of the hammered gold is a superb James I Rose Ryal in EF condition, in the hammered silver a pleasing Crown of Edward VI, 1551 and a delightful Groat of Richard III. In the milled gold section is a bold Two Guinea of Charles II 1678/7, which once graced the collection of Archbishop Sharp. An impressive 'fine work' Two Guineas of 1701 also features. In the milled silver section is a James II Crown in about Extremely Fine condition. The copper highlight is a Pattern Queen Anne Halfpenny with virtually full mint red lustre, followed by three very Victoria copper pennies.

The World Coins selection in this Fixed Price List offers a range of interesting European coins and ever-popular South American silver cobs. The selection opens with two impressive Double Talers of the Holy Roman Empire followed by colonial silver cobs minted in Potosi, Bolivia. From French coins, the highlight is a Louis d'or of the Sun King Louis XIV which is graded among the finest known in its category. Italy is represented by medieval silver coins of various Italian states and republics including Lucca, Ferrara, Pisa, Milan, Sicily and Venice. Finally, this list is concluded by medieval Spanish silver Reales and Dineros minted in Sevilla. Stunning Reales minted during King Enrique II are particularly notable in quality. We hope you will enjoy our new catalogue!

The pure copper composition caused the coins to wear more quickly than other metals or composites, making high grade specimens very scarce indeed. Varieties and changes in design have been recorded throughout this age by Greuber, Bramahs, and notably in more recent times, Pecks and Gouby. These varieties representing the smallest fraction of the already relatively small issue, it is little wonder that some are not spotted or recorded by such notable numismatists. 1858 has notably the largest number of reworked dies within the whole of the Victoria copper issues; the actual obverse dies used have been recorded as 1852, 1853, 1856, 1857. This in turn would lead one to believe the same process would have been undertaken with the reverse dies, but little to no interest has been paid to their study. A reference was found by chance, and noted, in an old Coin Guide of an 1858 penny reverse with a Large Rose, this reference was taken as no more than the recording of a newly completed rose whereas before the top petal was missing from most copper penny reverses. No images or other distinguishing factors were given (this was an age of typed descriptions not images). It wasn't until a few years later after inspecting all 1858 Pennies available for commerce that the 1858 Large Rose Penny was finally discovered. The Rose, much larger, along with the Thistle, leaves, and shamrock within the exergue had been reworked and the emblem was proportionally similar to that of the Halfpenny.
