FOREWORD

The ancient section of this list begins with coins from the Greek world. Of note is a pleasingly well-centred didrachm from Selinos, with the large parsley leaf (#4), a large silver tetradrachm of Gela with an impressive man-headed bull (#6), a pleasing gold stater of Philip II (#12) and numerous other high-grade examples from across mainland Greece and Asia Minor, including two superb staters from Aegina, a turtle (#27) and tortoise (#28), the latter of which boasts an enormous flan. Also of note are exemptional staters from Tarsos (#35) with an impressive Hoplite, and Mallos (#36) depicting a beautiful swan. The Shekel and Sela of Judaea (#41 and #42) are not to be overlooked. These are followed by Bactrian silver coins from various properties, offering a chance to acquire a plethora of different Indo-Greek rulers, including the very rare Apollophanes (#73). The Roman coin section kicks off with coins relating to Roman Britain, starting with possibly the first reference to Britain in all numismatics – the Claudian Didrachm from Caesarea (#74), followed by the legendary De Britann Aureus (#75), Hadrian Britannia (#76) and a rare denarius of Carausius (#77). The Republican coins cover a range of types and price points, and the Imperial era offers the chance to grab a handful of the Twelve Caesars. For collectors of high-grade denarii, we have a large quantity of 'Good Emperors' in silver, supplemented with high-grade aureii (#123, 133, 135 and 145). Rare silver miliarense and siliquae from the Vale of Pewsey Hoard will also be of interest. From the Byzantine world, we have two exceptional gold solidi of Justinian II with the portrait of Christ (#191 and 192), followed by a solidus of the first Byzantine sole empress, Irene (#193). The Celtic sections includes coins of various metals, the most impressive being a full-flan 'Domino' stater (#203) and a pleasing stater of Cunobelin (#215).

The British coins begin with a small collection of attractive Early Ango-Saxon pieces, leading with a rare gold thrymsa/shilling (#216) and following on with sceattas minted in England and the Low Countries, bearing a variety of abstract designs. In the silver pennies, noteworthy are rare examples of Harthacnut (#229) and Henry I (#230). The hammered section continues with a superb gold noble of Richard II (#231) and the Tudor era is represented by an iconic testoon of Henry VIII (#234) and a large gold sovereign of Edward VI (#235), followed by a more affordable example (#236). Queen Elizabeth I appears on numerous gold and silver coins and the 'Portcullis Money' One Testern (#247) is of extreme rarity. Into the Stuarts and we have gold coins of James I and Charles, including a gold Rose Ryal (#248) and a beautiful 'Declaration' Half Unite (#252). Further into the Civil Wars, we have a colossal silver pound (#254) and two Newark siege pieces (#256 and #257). These are followed by coins of the Commonwealth and a rare Cromwell sixpence (#261).

For collectors of early-milled, we have two gold five guineas of Charles II (#264 and #265) and a very rare crown of 1666, with the elephant mint-mark (#266) – this is followed by an Extremely Fine 1671 crown (#267). James II appears on an exceptional two guinea piece (#268) and a pleasing guinea (#269) along with other denominations in silver. Perhaps a highlight of this list is an excessively rare 1830 Pattern William IV Sovereign – R6 with only 3-5 specimens known (#304).

In World Coins we are proud to present some of the most beautiful coins, especially selected for this Christmas Fixed Price List. The World selection opens with the finest known Taler of Joseph I, an overdate variety, graded MS 63 with wonderful details. Followed by a selection of Bolivian silver and gold coins. There is the ever-popular Tael minted in Hanoi to facilitate the opium trade in French Indochina, bearing the character for wealth (Fu) and graded AU 58. This is followed by a siege piece from the time of the Napoleonic occupation of Zara (Zadar). In this catalogue, there is a selection of French coins, with the highlight being the Florin of Eudes IV which is incredibly scarce. India is represented by a wide selection of Kushan Dinars and Mughal Mohurs of great quality. The highlights are the rare Mohur of Shah Jahan III and a Pridmore plate Bombay Rupee. There are also Jodhpur Mohurs, with the names of the British Kings George V and George VI. From Italy, the highlights are a lovely Half Scudo of Odoardo Farnese (the finest known) and a selection of Venetian gold Zecchini. From Japan, as always, there is a selection of beautiful gold Samurai money – the gold Kobans of different eras, all in fantastic condition. The World Coins conclude with American coins, with special highlights being colonial copper coins. Among them, a rare variety of Rosa Americana in high grade and Nova Constellatio coin with over 30 years of provenance. Also featured is an exceptional Carson City Trade Dollar from 1875 which is a rare and imposing piece.

In Islamic Coins, we are pleased to present a fine selection of Abbasid, Almoravid, Fatimid and Umayyad Dinars. There is also an interesting Arab-Sasanian Drachm with a Hephthalite countermark, rare of such quality. A Great Mongol Dirham bearing the name of Chingiz Khan is an important addition to any collection of Mongol coinage. Islamic Coins conclude with a selection of high quality Umayyad Dinars, all lustrous and incredible coins from one of the earliest Caliphates.

East India Company trade coinage, or as they are known in common parlance 'Portcullis money' were a drive by the Tower mint to produce trade coinage for use in the far east, backed by the East India Company. Issued in four distinct denominations, the eight, four, two and one testern, all carrying mintmark O, struck to the weights and composition of the Spanish Reales series. Despite the testern series of coins specifically being issued for the East Indies, the weight and fineness of these pieces made them admissible anywhere where the Spanish dollar circulated, inclusive of the American Colonies post 1607.

It could be argued all are rare in excellent condition, regardless of the aforementioned variations.

With only a handful believed to be in existence, the above coin is a perfect example of a true Victorian copper penny rarity. Victorian Copper Pennies have seemingly seen little change over their lifetime of issue; fairly large quantities were issued in comparison to earlier reigns but are scarce in number when compared to the massive issues of the smaller bronze pennies of 1860-94.

The pure copper composition caused the coins to wear more quickly than other metals or composites, making high grade specimens very scarce indeed. Varieties and changes in design have been recorded throughout this age by Greuber, Bramahs, and notably in more recent times, Pecks and Gouby. These varieties representing the smallest fraction of the already relatively small issue, it is little wonder that some are not spotted or recorded by such notable numismatists.

1858 has notably the largest number of reworked dies within the whole of the Victoria copper issues; the actual obverse dies used have been recorded as 1852, 1853, 1856, 1857. This in turn would lead one to believe the same process would have been undertaken with the reverse dies, but little to no interest has been paid to their study. A reference was found by chance, and noted, in an old Coin Guide of an 1858 penny reverse with a Large Rose, this reference was taken as no more than the recording of a newly completed rose whereas before the top petal was missing from most copper penny reverses. No images or other distinguishing factors were given (this was an age of typed descriptions not images). It wasn't until a few years later after inspecting all 1858 Pennies available for commerce that the 1858 Large Rose Penny was finally discovered. The Rose, much larger, along with the Thistle, leaves, and shamrock within the exergue had been reworked and the emblem was proportionally similar to that of the Halfpenny.

Pontano served as Secretary to Alfonso I. Pollard believed the portrait to derive from a Roman original.
